- Founded 1877
- Col. Albert Pope
- Very Industrious Army Officer
- Saw Bicycles in England
- Transferred the Technology
- Started Manufacturing in Hartford
- High Wheelers or Boneshakers
- \$95. Per Bike

- Over 1500 Patents
- First Electric Automobile
- Exercisers
- Realized Horse and carriages were not here to stay
- Saw the Need for Modern Roads

- Bankers Would not finance his Automobile Plant
- Legend has it; Henry Ford Interned under Him
- POPE is Known as the Father of Modern Roads in America
- Due to Lack of Founds, Pope Dropped the Automobile Idea

- Moved the Factory to Current Location in Early 1900's
- Continued Making Bicycles
- Business Changed Hand Several Times
- During the 2nd World War Helped the War Efforts
- Made Parachute Bicycles

- Company Sold to MTD in 1967
- Expanded to 500,000 Sq. ft. in size
- 3 Shifts, over 2000 Employees
- 4300 Bicycles per day
- Exercisers, Lawn Mowers, Mopeds, Baby Carriages

- Mid 1980's Outlook Changed
- Cheap Asian Bicycled Dominated
- MTD Lost Interest in Bicycles
- Environmental Issues Surfaced for the old Plant

- Company Filed For Chapter 11 in 1991
- MTD Forced to Deal with the Environmental Issues
- IT Took Nearly 25 Years to Address major AOC's and Clean the Site
- Closure Plan Submitted And Approved

- Company Emerged out of Chapter 11 in 1993
- Reorganized as a school Furniture Factory
- Did very Little Bicycles
- New Forward and Progressive outlook to the Future

- Columbia Had Been in School Furniture Business Since 1952
- Always known to be the Premium and innovative Manufacturer
- Over 75% of Products sold in 2011 were new design and models

- New Environmental Outlook
- Get Away from Plating
- Convert the Spray Painting to Powder Coating
- No more Fuel Oil, convert to Natural Gas Or Alternatives
- No Solvents and degreasers
- Eliminate or Minimize Discharge

- First Move. Elimination of Spray Painting
- Accomplished in 1993
- No more VOC's
- Two Goals in Mind
- ELIMINATE SPRAY PAINTING
- GET AWAY FROM CHROME PLATING
- Developed the Trade Mark SPEC-FLEK
- SCUFF PROOF EPOXY COATED
- Passes 5 different "ASTM" Tests Hardness, Impact, Salt Spray and Acid Resistance

- Corporate Goal was to Be out of Chrome Plating Business by 1997
- Needed an Alternative
- Hence SPEC-FLEK
- Prior to 1997 Less Than 1% of Volume Had Painted Frames
- By 1997 Figure Rose TO 3%
- Today up to 25% of All Frames are Painted

- Less Costly
- Recyclable
- Environmentally Friendly
- And NO VOC's

- Easy To Use
- Simple Transition and Training
- A Fantastic Alternative to Chrome








- Columbia has Invested Nearly \$6,000,000 in Environmental technologies and Infrastructure Since 1993
- A Sizable Investment for a Small Company
- Business Prospect Was Very Strong
- Business Grew by 140% in 4 Years
- Old Technology Could not Meet Company's Environmental Goals or Increased Volume


- Corporations Need To Look at Issues Long Term
