Somerville wins green award

The Toxics Use Reduction Institute recognized the accomplishments of Somerville's Environmental Protection Office for its Lively Somerville Project at the annual State House ceremony on June 15. TURI awarded a community grant to Somerville in the 2003 to introduce practical green building principles to businesses, residents and local government officials.

The grant is helping the city of Somerville to initiate public education on green building concepts and the health impacts of poor indoor air quality associated with toxics in building material," said Vithal Deshpande, project leader. Specific initiatives include introducing safer alternatives and communicating through brochures, a Web site and training sessions for homeowners and contractors.
